COURSE DESCRIPTION AND LEARNING OBJECTIVES: This three hour course will satisfy an elective requirement for both the Health Law and Policy and Litigation and Dispute Resolution specializations. This course will provide law students with a basic understanding of the federal and state rules of evidence and ethical considerations addressing scientific and medical evidence. A particular emphasis will be placed on expert witness testimony and related trial practice skills, but other substantive cutting edge scientific topics anticipating eventual litigation will also be addressed. Students will learn to use scientific and medical evidence in both civil and criminal legal contexts, developing expertise in understanding legal and non-legal standards of reliability and in analogizing precedent in cases of first impression.

REQUIRED TEXTBOOK: None – readings as assigned on syllabus

OFFICE HOURS: Open door or by appointment.

ATTENDANCE: Students may miss up to a maximum of four (4) classes. Late arrival and early departure from class should be rare and may be counted as an absence based on the professor's discretion.
