- **Required Books:** Wright, Oakley & Bassett, *Federal Courts* (14th ed.); Casebook Supplement (available on TWEN); Student Packet (available on TWEN). In reading the casebook material, pay attention to the note material found in the authors' footnotes, because this material is important and will be covered on the exam.
- Study Aid: Eugene Chemerinski, Federal Jurisdiction
- **Final Exam:** True-false/multiple choice (closed book) and essay questions (open book and open note). Held on April 28, 2020 at 1:15 p.m.
- **WAC Exercise:** Draft the jurisdiction and venue parts of a federal court Complaint and a Notice of Removal. This exercise is worth 20 points (about 10% of your course grade).
- **Bar Exam Question**: The faculty is committed to preparing you to pass the bar exam on the first try. I will administer a practice bar exam question sometime in the second half of the course graded on a pass-fail basis with written feedback. You must pass in order to pass the course.
- **Recording:** All classes will be recorded.
- Absences: The absence limit is six. If you need to miss a class due to illness, job interview, moot court competition, or other good reason, I will give instructor permission to view the recording and my secretary will refund your absence when you report that you have viewed the recording.
- Assignments: I call on students in alphabetical order, three students per class. *If you are going to be absent on a day when you are scheduled for discussion, you must trade assigned days with someone who will be present on your assigned day.*
- **Consultation:** Feel free to ask for help in your outside work during your law school years and after you graduate.
- Workload: The American Bar Association standards for accrediting law schools contain a formula for calculating the amount of work that constitutes one credit hour. According to ABA Standard 310(b)(1), "a "credit hour" is an amount of work that reasonably approximates: (1) not less than one hour of classroom or direct faculty instruction and two hours of out-of-class student work per week for fifteen weeks, or the equivalent amount of work over a different amount of time." This is a 3-credit hour class, meaning that we will spend two 75-minute blocks of time together each week. The

average reading assignment per class is about 30 pages. Based on my teaching experience, I believe the average student will need to spend 2-3 hours outside of class on these reading assignments in order to prepare for class. To make your class preparation more efficient, I have posted in advance the Powerpoints we will use in class. The slides summarize the facts and legal issues for each case, which should help you in sorting out these matters and enable you to focus on the court's reasoning. In addition, the WAC assignment should require about 4 hours of research and drafting time. The final examination should require about 15-20 hours of exam preparation.

- **Objectives:** At the end of this course, students will be able to (1) identify and predict how courts will resolve federal jurisdiction issues that often arise in federal litigation practice; (2) identify and predict how courts will resolve other issues that sometimes arise in federal litigation practice, such as justiciability, state sovereign immunity, abstension, and federal common.
