Course Description and Objectives:

Students who successfully complete this course will:

- Understand the fundamentals of medical malpractice law, including: the nature of the patient professional relationship, informed consent, confidentiality, standards of care, defenses to malpractice actions, novel theories of liability, and institutional liability.
- Appreciate the policy issues underlying medical malpractice law, including individual physician versus health care institutional liability.

Grading

Midterm Examination – 25% – Due March 8, 2025

The midterm exam is a 2-page, take-home writing assignment. 80% of the mid-term grade will be based on subject-matter knowledge and the ability to analyze the problem and then apply the law to the problem presented. The remaining 20% will be based on grammar, punctuation, and other style elements. The mid-term assignment will constitute 25% of the final grade. Please take this as an opportunity to polish your analyzing and writing skills, as they will stand you in good stead in the practice of law (or anywhere else, as a matter of fact). The mid-term exam must be turned in to Professor Ryan on D2L no later than 4:30 p.m. on Wednesday, March 5, 2025.

Final Examination – 75% – Due at the regularly scheduled final exam period for this class, established by the Associate Dean and the Registrar.

The final exam will be a 2.5-hour, closed-book, closed-notes essay exam to be written in a formal final examination environment, as specified by the Registrar's Office. 90% of the exam grade will be based on demonstrated knowledge, analysis, and application of the relevant legal principles, and on public policies underpinning medical malpractice law – applied to a given

fact pattern and related questions provided on the exam. The remaining 10% will be based on grammar, punctuation, and other style elements. In total, the final exam will make up 75% of the class grade.

<u>Attendance</u>

This course meets on Wednesdays from 4:30 pm to 7:00 pm in Lesar 206. Class starts *promptly.*, so please be on time and ready to go. As specified in the *Rules of the Southern Illinois University School of Law*, "[r]egular attendance to class meetings in all courses is expected and required of all students.... Attendance will be taken in class and attendance records will be kept. Violation of this rule shall subject the student to penalties...." Roll will be taken at the beginning of each class.

- Students may have no more than a maximum of three (3) unexcused absences. Students with more than three (3) absences will be referred to the Associate Dean and may be given a failing grade for the course.
- Furthermore, students will be called on in class and are expected to be prepared. Being "prepared" means being ready and able to intelligently discuss all facets of the assigned materials. Students found to be unprepared by the Professor will be marked absent for the day. If for some good, verifiable reason (in the view of the instructor) you are unprepared for class, please let us know by noon the day of class. You may still be counted as absent, depending on your excuse, but you will not be called on and humiliated.
- Students may **NOT** "Note Out" of this class.
