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Course Description: Externships give you a chance to put classroom learning to work. You have a supervising attorney, and you have access to Professor Dale Aschemann as a faculty advisor. Six virtual class sessions will help you set expectations, ask questions, and connect with students in other externship placements

Course Objectives: You will deepen your understanding of how the legal profession works. You can expect to:

Practice legal research and writing skills in a variety of contexts.

Learn substantive and procedural law.

Appreciate professional responsibility in action.

Develop understanding of the judicial system where the student is working.

See the customs and courtesies that exist among lawyers and within law offices.

Texts for the Course: None required.

Course Requirements and Evaluation: This course is graded on a satisfactory/unsatisfactory basis. Assessment will be based on class attendance, hours in your completed timesheets, a self-evaluation, and an evaluation by your supervisor.

A. Attendance: You must attend and participate in at least five of the six offered classes.

B. Work requirements. Each week you will turn in a timesheet detailing the time you worked and the tasks you worked on. If your office uses a time reporting system, you can use that report, so long as no confidentiality is breached. Here is the chart of required work hours for corresponding course credit hours:

1 credit hour = 42.5 work hours.

2 credit hours = 85 work hours.

3 credit hours = 127.5 work hours.

4 credit hours = 170 work hours.

5 credit hours = 212.5 work hours.

6 credit hours = 255 work hours.

C. Self-evaluation. Before the end of the term, you must submit an evaluation of your learning experience. A sample format will be provided.

D. Supervisor's evaluation: Either your supervisor or Prof. Aschemann, with input from your supervisor, will complete an evaluation. The criteria upon which you will be evaluated will include work ethic, performance, timeliness, oral skills, written skills, and work product. You are responsible for confirming that the final evaluation has been completed.
